A Regular Meeting of the Town Board of the Town of Pendleton was held at the Town Hall, 6570 Campbell Blvd., Pendleton, NY, on the 14<sup>th</sup> day of July, 2025, at 7:00 p.m.

**PUBLIC HEARING #1**  
**PROPOSED LOCAL LAW NO. \_\_\_ OF 2025 – “AMENDMENT OF THE DEFINED BENEFIT SERVICE AWARD PROGRAM WHICH IS SPONSORED BY THE TOWN OF PENDLETON FOR ACTIVE VOLUNTEER FIREFIGHTER MEMBERS OF THE WENDELVILLE FIRE COMPANY, INC.”**

Supervisor Maerten opened the Public Hearing at 6:48 p.m.

The notice for the Public Hearing was published in the Lockport Union Sun & Journal on July 1, 2025 and on the Town’s website.

The purpose of the hearing was to hear from all interested parties and citizens regarding the adoption of a proposed local law. Said Local Law is to Amend the service award program that was been established for the Volunteer Firefighter members that provide firefighting services to the Town of Pendleton, and thereby increase the benefits so provided to such Firefighter members, in the following manner:

1. The Wendelville Fire Company, Inc. is the fire company having volunteer firefighters who are potential participants in the program;
2. The program will be administered by the Town of Pendleton.
3. The entitlement age under the program shall be sixty-five [65].
4. The estimated annual cost of program, including the estimated annual administration fee, will increase from approximately \$165,000.00 to \$250,000.00, the estimated annual administration fee shall remain as an additional \$6,600.00.
5. The amount of the annual contribution to the program to be made on behalf of each participant credited with a year of fire service will be approximately \$2,475.00 per covered participant.
6. The date as of which the program shall take effect shall be January 1, 2026.
7. The date on which the proposition authorizing the adoption of the program shall be submitted to referendum, shall occur on the November 4, 2025 general election for state and/or local government officers.

WHEREAS, in addition to those matters set forth above as required by General Municipal Law §216; the proposition to amend the term and provisions of the Defined Benefit Service Award Program for active members of the Wendelville Fire Company, Inc., will increase the monthly service award from twenty dollars [\$20.00] to thirty dollars [\$30.00] for each year beginning January 1, 2026 in which an active Volunteer Firefighter earns a year of service credit under the service award program point system AND would increase the maximum years of service credit that can be earned in the program from Thirty [30] years to Forty [40] years.

A copy of said proposed Local Law, was made available at the Town Clerk’s Office, 6570 Campbell Blvd, Lockport, New York 14094 and on the Town’s website.

Supervisor Maerten opened up the floor to public comments.

Wendelville Fire Company President, Russell Talma, stated that the fire company supports all efforts towards recruitment and retention of members especially as emergency calls rise while volunteer numbers decrease.

There were no additional comments from the public.

Motion made by Councilman Leible, seconded by Councilman Buechler, to close the Public Hearing at 6:49 p.m. Motion carried.

**PUBLIC HEARING #2  
PROPOSED EXTENSION OF SEWER IMPROVEMENT AREA NO. 1**

Supervisor Maerten opened the Public Hearing at 6:50 p.m.

The notice for the Public Hearing was published in the Lockport Union Sun & Journal on June 27, 2025 and on the Town's website.

The purpose of the hearing was to receive public input on the proposed extension of Town of Pendleton Sewer Improvement Area No. 1 to include the parcel associated with the Regency Estates subdivision as further described as follows:

ALL THAT TRACT OR PARCEL OF LAND, situated in the Town of Pendleton, County of Niagara and State of New York, being part of Lot 76, Township 13, Range 7 of the Holland Land Company's survey, bounded and described as follows:

BEGINNING at a point on the southeast line of Campbell Boulevard at its intersection with the north line of lands now or formerly conveyed to Sharon K. Brown by deed recorded in Liber 3350 of deeds at page 315;

Councilman Buechler inquired about the cost of the extension and was informed that there would be no cost to the Town. Engineer Britton explained that the costs are paid for by the developer as part of the Public Improvement Permit process.

A resident asked where the Regency Estates subdivision will be and was informed that it will be off of Campbell Boulevard across from the Dollar General Store.

There were no additional comments from the public.

**PUBLIC HEARING #3  
PROPOSED FORMATION OF STORMWATER DISTRICT**

Supervisor Maerten opened the Public Hearing at 6:55 p.m.

The notice for the Public Hearing was published in the Lockport Union Sun & Journal on June 27, 2025 and on the Town's website.

The purpose of the hearing was to receive public input on the formation of the Stormwater District entitled Regency Estates Storm District. The district boundary is further described as follows:

**OTHER REPORTS**

**Supervisor Maerten** reported that the tax collected for May 2025 was \$197,724.96. This is an increase of \$9,032.47 when compared with May 2024. The year to date received is \$1,008,192.73 which is an increase of \$25,029.15 from 2024.

**Councilman Leible** reported that the Town's Fourth of July celebration went well and thanked the Wendelville Fire Company for standing by during the event. He also noted that he facilitated recent furnace repairs on the north side of the building and expects that a full replacement will be

necessary before winter. Lastly, he reported that he is still in the process of obtaining quotes for resealing and striping the Town Hall parking lot.

**Councilman Lombardo** thanked Councilman Leible for all of his efforts in organizing the Fourth of July event. He also reported that they both met with the Town Justices to discuss the installation of electrical outlets on the dais in the meeting room, and noted that the project should be completed soon.

**Councilman Buechler** had nothing to report.

**Attorney Joerg** had no report.

**Engineer Britton** provided a brief update on the Community Center paving project, stating that a kick-off meeting was held last week and that the work may be completed as early as mid- to late August. A discussion also took place regarding the restoration of the tennis courts at both Town parks. Supervisor Maerten asked Mr. Britton to prepare detailed bid specifications to move the project forward.

## DEPARTMENT HEADS

**Town Clerk Maurer** reported that monthly reports were received from the Assessor and Building Inspector. These reports, along with the monthly reports for the Town Clerk and Water/Sewer collection, were posted online with the agenda documents.

Next, Mrs. Maurer informed the Board of the following monies received and collected in the month of June:

Mrs. Maurer also stated that water bills were expected to be mailed out this week and reminded residents that any unpaid balances after September 16th will be levied onto their 2026 tax bill. She further reported that pavilion rentals can now be made online through the Town's Parks and Recreation website.

Lastly, Mrs. Maurer noted that the Town Board portraits displayed in the room have been properly labeled with the names of former Town Board members. She thanked Deputy Clerk Aimee Jarvis for all of her help with the project.

**Building Inspector Barnes** reported that the contractor selected for property maintenance on unkempt Town properties has completed the job on Beach Ridge Road.

**Assessor Friert** reported that the Final Tax Roll is now available for viewing online. She also announced that the new Assessor's Clerk, Colleen Gebauer, began her first day earlier and expressed confidence that she will be a great asset to the Town.

**Recreation Director Covell** reported that the 2025 Summer Recreation Program began the previous week and seems to be going well. He also reminded everyone that the next Pendleton Station Market event will be on Sunday, July 20<sup>th</sup>.

WHEREAS, the Town of Pendleton (Town) is considering various improvements at the Depeau Park located in the Town of Pendleton, Niagara County. Depeau Park is currently owned by New York State, and any proposed site improvements by the Town are required to be completed by Permit with the New York State Canal Corporation. In general, the park Improvements include

replacement of the existing fencing, resurfacing the existing court surfaces, new posts and nets for tennis courts, restoration, and expanding the gravel parking.

WHEREAS, after comparing the thresholds in 6 NYCRR 617.4 and 617.5 under SEQR, the Town has determined that the proposed improvements do not meet the definition or thresholds of a Type 1 or Type 2 action and therefore potential environmental impacts will be reviewed under SEQRA as a coordinated unlisted action.

WHEREAS AND THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, that as an action under SEQR, the project is not expected to categorically have significant adverse impacts on the environment and therefore it is anticipated that a Negative Declaration of no adverse impact be issued and that no further review under SEQR will be required. Deputy Water and Sewer Superintendent Lucas Frew provided an update on a situation near the intersection of Tonawanda Creek Road and Alexander Parkway. His department has been investigating a persistent damp spot in the roadway at that location. The water line in question supplies the Hunter's Creek Condominiums on Alexander Parkway. Several tests have been conducted, and a review of the homeowners' water meters has not indicated any leaks. Mr. Frew is requesting leak detection services to determine whether the issue lies on the Town's side or if it is a matter that needs to be addressed by Hunter's Creek Condominiums.

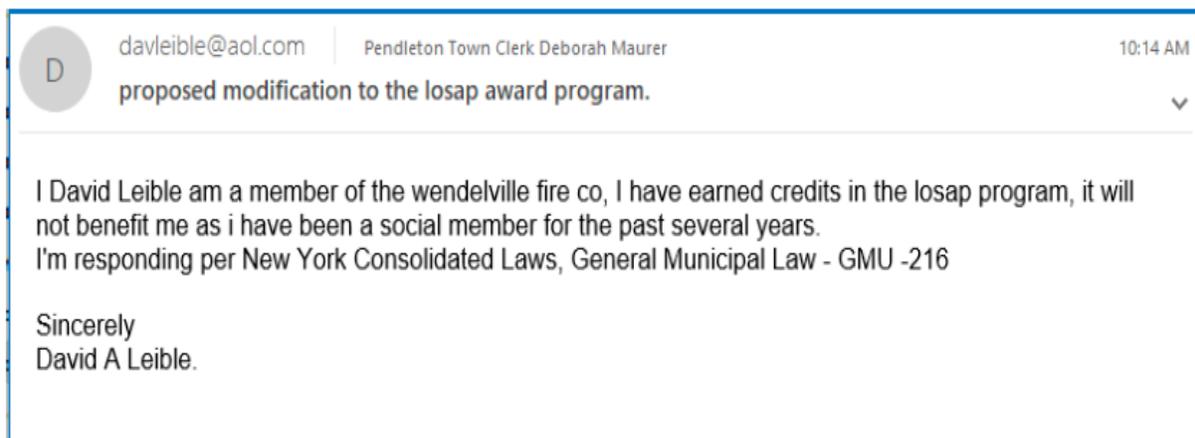

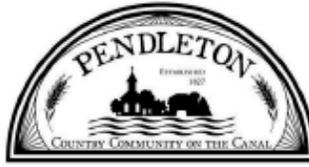

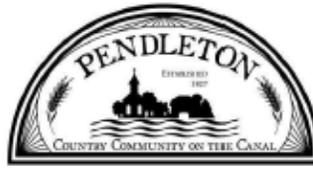

## **PUBLIC REMARKS/COMMENTS**

The first resident questioned why some departmental reports are not published online. Town Clerk Maurer responded that she posts all reports provided to her, noting occasional delays due to reports not being received from other departments.

Several residents living along Campbell Boulevard near Meyer Road addressed the Town Board with ongoing concerns regarding poor drainage and lack of maintenance of the roadside ditches in front of their homes. They described persistent standing water in the ditches and their yards, noting

that the conditions have worsened due to a lack of follow-up on complaints submitted as far back as October 2024.

Specific complaints included:

- Cattails being cut but not properly removed, resulting in thick piles (12”–18”) of debris that block water flow.
- Overgrown vegetation obstructing visibility when pulling out of driveways, creating a significant traffic safety hazard on a very busy roadway.
- Structural damage to private property, including one resident who reported losing a shed due to water damage.
- Concerns that the stagnant water may pose health risks, attract pests, and lower property values.

Residents expressed strong dissatisfaction with the town’s response, or lack thereof, and stated that repeated calls and emails had not resulted in any corrective action. They emphasized that the ditches need to be fully dredged—not just trimmed—and that a more permanent solution must be identified.

Several residents also urged the Town Board to work with the New York State Department of Transportation, as Campbell Boulevard is a state road, and coordination is essential for any long-term fix. Numerous photos were submitted as visual evidence of the flooding, overgrowth, and property damage.

Another resident inquired about door-to-door solicitors and whether they require a permit. Town Clerk Maurer acknowledged the issue, stating that the company in question has been instructed to cease operations until obtaining the necessary permits.

A potential property owner sought the Town Board’s permission to install a driveway on a “paper road.” She was informed that the Planning Board is aware of her request and will provide further guidance.

Lastly, a member of the audience commented on the paving of the parking lot in front of the new Community Center, expressing concerns about construction quality and payment delays to subcontractors.

No further public remarks or comments were made.

Motion by Councilman Leible, seconded by Councilman Lombardo, to adjourn from the Regular Meeting at 7:43 p.m. Motion carried.
