

**PENDLETON TOWN BOARD
REGULAR MEETING
August 11, 2025**

A Regular Meeting of the Town Board of the Town of Pendleton was held at the Town Hall, 6570 Campbell Blvd., Pendleton, NY, on the 11th day of August, 2025, at 7:00 p.m.

Supervisor Maerten called the meeting to order at 7:00 p.m.

She inquired why the Town's procurement policy was not being followed and whether the Town maintains contracts with the PVA and PSCC.

Another resident also commented on the abstracts, questioning how payments were being made under the H Fund when the budget does not include any appropriations.

OTHER REPORTS

Supervisor Maerten reported that the tax collected for June 2025 was \$257,999.10. This is an increase of \$45,918.35 when compared with June 2024. The year to date received is \$1,266,191.83 which an increase of \$70,947.50 from 2024.

Supervisor Maerten continued by saying that the Budget Officer is working on a draft 2026 Budget that will be presented to the Town Board in early September. He reminded department heads to communicate any specific needs to the Budget Officer as soon as possible.

Councilman Hickman reported that he spoke with Ed Dore of Dore Landscaping regarding missed landscaping maintenance in July. Mr. Dore assured him that the work would be addressed immediately. Councilman Hickman added that they also discussed several other issues that may need to be considered in the future.

Councilman Lombardo reported that he has been actively involved with recent repairs needed to the air conditioning systems at Town Hall. He also stated that he and Councilman Leible were in the process of obtaining quotes for new furnaces at Town Hall. Once received, the quotes will be provided to the Budget Officer for consideration in the 2026 Budget.

Councilman Buechler remarked that on a recent trip to Town Hall he noticed that the ball diamonds were packed and how nice it is to so many people utilizing our fields.

Attorney Joerg had nothing to report.

Engineer Britton provided updates on the following projects:

- GIS Implementation for utility mapping: Sanitary sewer manhole location and condition assessment is underway.
- Community Center: Trim work and concrete work are complete; the parking lot project is underway and expected to be finished by the end of August.
- Regency Estates Subdivision: The contractor has been working on establishing grades for the road and digging ponds.

DEPARTMENT HEADS

Town Clerk Maurer began by offering her condolences to the family of Councilman David Leible, who passed away suddenly. She expressed her respect and appreciation for his more than 20 years of service to the Town, noting that his dedication made a lasting impact on the community and that his absence will be deeply felt.

Next, Mrs. Maurer reported that monthly reports were received from the Assessor, Building Inspector, Dog Control Officer, Engineer, and Niagara County Deputy Sheriff Rutkowski. These reports, along with the monthly reports for the Town Clerk and Water/Sewer collection, have been posted online with the agenda documents.

She also informed the Board of the following revenues collected during the month of July:

- Total State, County, and Local Revenues: \$23,290.98
- Water/Sewer Collection: \$91,794.65

Mrs. Maurer further stated that she and Building Inspector Barnes sent letters to certain residents in the Bear Ridge Road area to inform them of potential eligibility for up to 50% reimbursement of septic system replacement costs. This opportunity is available through a grant Niagara County received under the New York State Septic System Replacement Program.

Highway Superintendent Fischer reported that his department began a culvert replacement project on Aiken Road earlier today and anticipates reopening the road to thru traffic by the end of the week. He also provided an update on repairs to the merry-go-round area at Mason's Mission Park, noting that the drainage work has been completed and the area should reopen by the weekend. Building Inspector Barnes stated that he had nothing additional to report beyond what was included in his monthly report posted online.

Assessor Friert reminded residents that if they receive a letter from New York State regarding the STAR Exemption/Credit program, they must respond in order to continue receiving the credit. She also explained that beginning with the 2026–2027 school tax year, the STAR Credit program will be fully administered by New York State, and residents will no longer apply through the Assessor's Office.

Recreation Director Covell reported that the final day of the 2025 Summer Recreation Program will be Tuesday, August 9. He and Summer Recreation Director Monica Wall are already working on the budget for next year's program. He also reminded residents that the Pendleton Station Market will be open on Sunday, August 20. In addition, Mr. Covell noted that the Buffalo Bomb Squad has concluded its 2025 baseball season, and that the Pendleton Athletic Booster Association (PABA) is currently using the Town's fields for practice while Starpoint undergoes construction.

NEW BUSINESS

Supervisor Maerten began by explaining that the first resolution to be considered pertained to the Bear Ridge Solar Project's request for a Payment in Lieu of Taxes (PILOT) Agreement. He noted that the counsel assisting the Town with this project has drafted a letter, to be sent by both the Town of Pendleton and the Town of Cambria, to the Niagara County Industrial Development Agency regarding the potential PILOT Agreement.

NOW, THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, by the Town Board of the Town of Pendleton on this 11th day of August 2025, that the Agreement for Expenditure of Highway Moneys presented to the Town Board by Highway Superintendent David Fischer is accepted. This resolution shall take effect immediately.

PUBLIC REMARKS/COMMENTS

The first speaker expressed concern that the Town had started another capital project, approved in February of this year, without taxpayers being provided details such as costs, expenditures to date, or who is overseeing the work. She asked how the project will be tracked. She stated that while she appreciates the Town’s proactive approach to Depeau Park, she was disappointed to learn that the Town does not actually own the park, suggesting that this may be misleading to the public. She also raised concerns about a potential conflict of interest with the Town Engineer also representing Nussbaumer & Clarke, Inc. In addition, she reiterated her concerns about the lack of clear procedures for public meetings, stating that the Supervisor selectively responds to residents, which she feels is unfair. She further questioned why the Board of Ethics meeting minutes have not been posted online; Town Clerk Maurer responded by providing instructions on where to locate them. Supervisor Maerten added that this portion of the meeting is designated for “public remarks and comments.”

The next speaker voiced concern about the approval of \$17,000 to Nussbaumer & Clarke, Inc. to oversee the Park Recreation Area Improvement Project, which includes revisions to Depeau Park. She also noted that the form being used for the 284 Agreement is not the current version.

She concluded her comments by expressing gratitude for the late Councilman Leible, recognizing his dedication to residents, his willingness to listen, and his care for the Town. She stated that he will be greatly missed and difficult to replace.

Another longtime resident shared personal memories of Councilman Leible, describing him as a unique individual who was always willing to help others. He also commented on the ongoing success of the Challenger League in Town and thanked resident Sara Siracuse for her continued support of the league. Lastly, speaking as a board member of the Pendleton Food Pantry, he reminded residents that this program is still active and available to those in need.

The final audience member commented on the Community Center construction, alleging that the Town selected a contractor who, according to documents he reviewed, was not properly bonded and was unsuitable for the project. He stated that this contributed to additional change orders, increased costs to taxpayers, and delays, noting several times that the Community Center is still not open.

No further public remarks or comments were made.

Supervisor Maerten has announced the following upcoming meetings:

- Tentative Town Board Work Session: No meeting is currently scheduled for Monday, August 25, 2025
- Town Board Regular Meeting: Scheduled for September 8, 2025, at 7:00 p.m.
- A Special Meeting may need to be scheduled prior to the September meeting.
